About the FIH Hockey Men's World Cup

Held every four years, the FIH Hockey Men's World Cup brings together the world's greatest teams and players for the toughest, most skilful and entertaining international hockey imaginable.

This showpiece tournament combines extraordinary talent levels with unrivalled prestige to serve as the climax of the world hockey calendar. The Hockey World Cup provides a unique chance to achieve sporting immortality. Every nation, team and player has the chance to attain true legendary status, with a place in hockey's history books being reserved for the competition winners.

Offering contrasting styles and skills, the players step onto the biggest stage with the simplest of equations: win your matches or go home empty handed. Global superstars compete for national pride, personal greatness and ultimate glory.

The number of teams that compete in the FIH Hockey Men's World Cup has changed at various points in history. This 2023 edition in Bhubaneswar and Rourkela contains 16 nations, matching that of the 2002 competition in Kuala Lumpur (MAS) and 2018 event in Bhubaneswar. The 1971 competition in Barcelona (ESP) featured ten nations while the 1978 event in Buenos Aires (ARG) was a 14-nation tournament. All other World Cup competitions have been 12 nation events.

FIH Hockey Men's World Cup: A History



Throughout the 20th century, the sport of hockey has shared an intricate bond with the Olympic Games, ever since its first introduction in 1908 London Games. The history of the Hockey World Cup however is much more recent in comparison, with the first edition being played in 1971.

The early years of Hockey history was largely dominated by Asian teams as India and Pakistan between them won 11 of the first 15 gold medals in men's hockey at the Olympic





Games. However, in the late 60s and early 70s the global popularity of Hockey started to grow, especially amongst the European nations. The introduction of the artificial grass surfaces further changed the global dynamics of hockey as the increased pace of the game saw a reversal in fortunes for the Asian teams who struggled to modify decades-long style of play, while the European teams found their footing on the surface rather swiftly.

With the increasing popularity and sudden shift away from Asian domination, the concept of a Hockey World Cup was born in 1969, in an attempt to add to the Olympic Games which were the only international tournaments for hockey at the time.

The idea of a Hockey World Cup was first proposed jointly by India and Pakistan in an International Hockey Federation council meeting in March 1969. At the time the World Cup was proposed as a biennial event, and Pakistan Hockey Federation chief Air Marshal Nur Khan (who is also credited for first conceptualizing the Champions Trophy) proposed for the inaugural edition of the World Cup to be held in Pakistan.

The proposal for the World Cup was accepted, but due to increasingly tense relations between India and Pakistan, the two most successful hockey teams at that point in time, the inaugural edition was played in Spain instead of Pakistan.

Pakistan did end up as the first winners of the FIH Hockey Men's World Cup, narrowly beating Spain 1-0 in the finals. They further went on to win three more gold medals at the World Cup making them the most successful team in the Men's World Cup history. Australia and Netherlands follow closely behind with three gold medals each. Germany is the next most successful team with two gold medals while India and Belgium have won one gold each. India's only success came in the third edition in 1975, while Belgium are the current reigning world champions having won the 2018 FIH Odisha Hockey Men's World Cup.

The World Cup was held biennially from 1971 to 1975. The 4th edition was held in 1978 and the following editions since then have been held once every four years starting from 1982. The FIH Odisha Hockey Men's World Cup 2023 will be the first time a nation has played host to the World Cup for two successive editions. However, unlike in 2018, Kalinga Hockey Stadium in Bhubaneswar will not be the only venue as the brand-new Birsa Munda Hockey stadium in Rourkela will split hosting duties with Bhubaneswar in the upcoming World Cup.

About the trophy

The Hockey World Cup is a masterpiece of craftsmanship. Carved out of gold and silver, it exhibits a hockey stick and ball atop of a large, embellished globe. The designer was Basheer Moojid, with workmanship being carried out in Pakistan by members of the Electrical and Mechanical Engineers Corps of the Pakistan Army.

Including the base, the trophy stands 650 mm (26 in). It weighs 11,560 g (408 oz), including 895g (31.6 oz) of gold, 6,815g (240.4 oz) of silver, 350 g (12 oz) of ivory and 3,500g (120 oz) of teak.

On 27 March 1971, the World Cup trophy was formally presented to FIH President Rene Frank at the then FIH headquarters in Brussels by Mr H. E. Masood, the Pakistani Ambassador to Belgium. The trophy has been presented to the winning team at every World Cup since the inaugural edition in 1971.





About the host cities and venues

About Bhubaneswar

City of culture

Bhubaneswar is a hockey cauldron of players and fans with Kalinga Stadium boasting a recently updated Olympic level hockey pitch. However, what you may not know about this 'hockey city' is that it's also known as the "Temple City of India" with thousands of ancient temples, some dating back to earlier than the 11th Century and hundreds of temples standing the test of time and available to visit.



The Golden Triangle

One of the top attractions in the East of India is the destinations known as the "Swarna Tribhuj" Golden Triangle – which are made up of Puri (a site of religious significance) and Konark a city on the coast by the Bay of Bengal. Konark is the site of the 13th-century Sun Temple, also known as the Black Pagoda, built in black granite during the reign of Narasimhadeva-I and now a World Heritage Site.

Konark is also home to an annual dance festival called Konark Dance Festival, held every December, devoted to classical Indian dance forms, including the traditional classical dance of Odisha; Odissi. While you are in Swarna Tribhuj you must also check out the famous applique work of Pipli; these brightly coloured and layer garments are magnificent using traditional methods.

About the Kalinga Hockey Stadium



Built in 2010 with a capacity of 5,000 spectators, the Kalinga Hockey Stadium played host to the Men's Champions Trophy in 2014 and the Odisha Hockey World League Final in 2017. It is also the home ground of Hockey India League side the Kalinga Lancers.

In preparation for the showpiece Odisha Hockey Men's World Cup Bhubaneswar 2018, the Kalinga Hockey Stadium underwent a huge transformation. An impressive refurbishment saw the construction of new stands to increase the capacity to 15,000, with both the stadium pitch and nearby practice pitches being re-laid. Widely regarded as one of the finest hockey arenas anywhere in the world, it is a stadium perfectly suited to welcoming the world's greatest teams and players. The stadium will host 24 of the 44 matches at this World Cup, including the showpiece final and bronze medal match.

About Rourkela

Located 300km north by north-west of Bhubaneswar lies the city of Rourkela. The history of the city is intertwined with India's first public sector steel plant. The Steel Authority of India (SAIL) set up the plant in the 1960's with the help of German conglomerate Krupp and Demag. Since then, Rourkela has kept with modernization and grown to become one of Odisha's best planned and picturesque cities. As a whole Rourkela is perfect confluence of a city living and a nature retreat.

Set within rolling hills, the city is dotted with luscious forests, waterfalls, and creeks, all of which makes it a great wilderness destination.

About the Birsa Munda International Hockey Stadium



Named after the tribal leader and famous freedom fighter Birsa Munda, the Birsa Munda International Hockey Stadium has been constructed especially for this event and is officially the largest hockey stadium in India. It will host 20 out of the 44 matches being played in this competition.

With a total capacity of 20,000, the State of Odisha is now blessed with two genuinely world class hockey arenas, complementing the already iconic Kalinga Stadium in Bhubaneswar. Following the completion of the FIH Men's World Cup, the stadium will be used to host several of India's matches in the FIH Hockey Pro League.

Argentina

Nickname: Los Leones

How they qualified: 1st Place – 2022 Men's Pan American Cup

Notable honours: Olympic gold medallists (2016), FIH Men's World Cup bronze medallists (2014), Hockey World League silver medallists (2017), 10x Pan American Games winners (1967, 1971, 1975, 1979, 1991, 1995, 2003, 2011, 2015, 2019), 4x Pan American Cup winners (2004, 2013, 2017, 2022), FIH Champions Trophy bronze medallists (2008), 3x FIH Champions Challenge 1 winners (2005, 2007, 2012), Sultan Azlan Shah Cup winners (2008).

About the team: The Olympic champions from Rio 2016 are Pan American hockey's most potent force, having been crowned continental champions on 14 separate occasions. With a swashbuckling style and incredible technical ability, Los Leones can match any team on the planet. The team is coached by former Argentina goalkeeper Mariano Ronconi, who will do all he can to lead his talented group to a first men's World Cup title.



Although the squad has not been confirmed at the time of writing, it is expected to contain at least three veterans of that glorious gold medal winning squad from Rio 2016. Agustin Mazzilli, Lucas Vila and team captain Matias Rey – named Player of the Tournament as his team swept to victory in the 2022 Men's Pan American Cup in Santiago, Chile to seal their ticket to this event – remain outstanding performers despite being well into their 30s. The team recorded a notable 2-1 victory over reigning Olympic and World champions Belgium in November, providing a timely reminder that they can match the best in the business. Can Argentina emulate their men's football team by winning a World Cup on Asian soil?

One to watch: Maico Casella. A creative, intelligent attacker capable of scoring spectacular goals. Netted eight times in the 2022 Men's Pan American Cup to help Los Leones to their fourth title.

Australia

Nickname: The Kookaburras

How they qualified: Oceania quota*

Notable honours: Olympic gold medallists (2004) 4x Olympic silver medallists (1968, 1976, 1992, 2021), 5x Olympic bronze medallists (1964, 1996, 2000, 2008, 2012), 3x FIH Men's World Cup winners (1986, 2010, 2014), FIH Hockey Pro League champions (2019), Hockey World League champions (2015, 2017), 15x Champions Trophy winners (1983, 1984, 1985, 1989, 1990, 1993, 1999, 2005, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2016, 2018), 7x Commonwealth Games gold medallists (1998, 2002, 2006, 2010, 2014, 2018, 2022), 11x Oceania Cup champions (1999, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019).

The Kookaburras are the most consistently outstanding men's hockey team of the last 30 years, having remained in the top four of the FIH World Rankings for the duration of that period. They have won every prize available, including Olympic, World Cup, FIH Hockey Pro League and Oceania Cup titles.



Most recently, the side coached by former striker Colin Batch claimed a sensational seventh Commonwealth Games title, obliterating a hugely talented India team 7-0 in the event final in Birmingham. Nathan Ephraums and Jacob Anderson, the latter a travelling reserve for this event, both scored twice with Blake Govers, Tom Wickham and Flynn Ogilvie also netting in typically devastating display from the brilliant Aussies. A shoot-out loss to Belgium in the gold medal match at the delayed Olympic Games Tokyo 2020 was painful but may serve as motivation as the brilliant Aussies go in search of a record-equalling fourth world title.

One to watch: Eddie Ockenden. One of hockey's all-time greats, 35-year-old co-captain Ockenden is Australia's record caps holder, being one of just seven players in the history of men's hockey to have made more than 400 international appearances. Equally comfortable in defence or midfield and blessed with composure in the most stressful of situations, Ockenden – a world champion with the Kookaburras both 2010 and 2014 – remains a pivotal figure.

France

Nickname: Les Bleus

How they qualified: 2nd Place – Men's FIH Hockey World Cup – European Qualifier

Notable honours: 4th place – Olympic Games (1920, 1928, 1936), 7th place – FIH Men's World Cup (1971, 1990), 8th place – FIH Men's World Cup (2018), 6th place – FIH Champions Trophy (1992), 4th place – EuroHockey Nations Championship (1970)

Rank in previous WC editions: 1971 – 7th, 1990 – 7th, 2018 – 8th.

About the team: In 2018, France arrived in Bhubaneswar for their first FIH Men's World Cup for 28 years, with their last appearance coming at 1990 competition in Lahore, Pakistan, where they finished seventh. Having been drawn in the same pool as Rio 2016 Olympic champions Argentina, Spain, and New Zealand, many expected them to be on the first plane out of India. However, after suffering a narrow defeat against the Black Sticks, Les Bleus achieved a set of results which would see them go all the way to the World Cup quarter finals. A draw with higher-ranked Spain was followed by a stunning 5-3 victory over Argentina, sealing their place in the knock-out stages of the competition, where they beat China to set up a last eight meeting with Australia. Although the mighty Kookaburras brought France's magnificent run to an end, they left the competition with their heads held high, having earned respect from everyone who saw them in action.



Since then, France – who are building towards the Olympic Games Paris 2024, where they will compete as hosts – have been going from strength to strength. They competed in the 2021-22 edition of the FIH Hockey Pro League, registering wins against India, South Africa, and Argentina before earning their ticket to this event with a second-place finish at the European Qualification event in Cardiff, won by hosts Wales. A fifth-place finish at the recent FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup South Africa 2022 event was perhaps below expectations, but with the likes of penalty corner ace Victor Charlet and outstanding attacking talent Timothée Clément, France will be a dangerous outfit here in Odisha.

One to watch: Timothée Clément. A young man with the world at his feet. Crowned Best Player of the Tournament at the FIH Odisha Hockey Men's Junior World Cup Bhubaneswar 2021, where France claimed the bronze medal, before being named voted as the men's FIH Rising Star of the Year for 2021-22.

South Africa

How they qualified: 1st Place – 2022 Men's Hockey Africa Cup of Nations

Notable honours: 8x Africa Cup of Nations gold medallists (1993, 1996, 2000, 2005, 2009, 2013, 2017, 2022), 2x All-Africa Games gold medallists (1995, 1999), 4x African Olympic Qualifier champions (2007, 2011, 2015, 2019), 10th Place – Hockey World Cup (2010), 10th Place – Olympic Games (1996, 2004). FIH Champions Challenge silver medallists (2001), FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup champions (2022).

Rank in previous WC editions: 1994 – 10th, 2002 – 13th, 2006 – 12th, 2010 – 10th, 2014 – 11th, 2018 – 16th.

About the team: Following their superb title victory in the recent FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup, earning them a ticket to the next edition of the elite FIH Hockey Pro League, South Africa have every reason to believe that they can achieve big things here in Odisha. The tournament hosts finished top of the pile on home soil in Potchefstroom, recording victories over Pakistan, France, and Korea before claiming a thrilling 4-3 win against Ireland – who they had lost to earlier in the competition – in the competition final. Inspirational 23-year-old captain Dayaan Cassiem scored twice in the title match, with younger sibling Mustaphaa netting a penalty stroke won by his big brother.



The outrageously gifted Cassiem brothers may be the poster boys of this hugely exciting new generation, but the team are far from reliant on them. Striker Tevin Kok is proving himself to be a reliable source of goals, while 33-year-old defender Jethro Eustice brings a steady, experienced head to a group brimming with youth and talent.

One to watch: Dayaan Cassiem. A livewire forward capable of hurting the very best teams in the world, a fact proven by some extraordinary individual performances at the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020 and more recently in the FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup.

Nickname: The Red Lions

How they qualified: 3rd Place – 2021 Men's EuroHockey Championship

Notable honours: FIH Hockey World Cup winners (2018), Olympic gold medallists (2021), Olympic silver medallists (2016), Olympic bronze medallists (1920), FIH Hockey Pro League champions (2020-21), FIH Hockey Pro League silver medallists (2019, 2021-22), Hockey World League silver medallists (2015), European champions (2019), European silver medallists (2013, 2017), European bronze medallists (2007, 2021), 5th place - Olympic Games (2012)

Rank in previous WC editions: 1973 – 8th, 1978 – 14th, 1994 – 11th, 2002 – 14th, 2014 – 5th, 2018 – 1st.

About the team: Belgium's rise from European also-rans to the summit of global hockey has been one of the standout stories of the past two decades. In the past five years the Red Lions have won every major title on offer, including the World Cup (2018), Olympic Games (2021), European Championship (2019) and FIH Hockey Pro League (2020-21). It would take a brave person to bet against them successfully defending the world title they so memorably claimed four years ago in Bhubaneswar.



The team coached by Dutchman Michel van den Heuvel contains some of the world's finest players, proven winners who have claimed the biggest titles on the greatest of stages. In Vincent Vanasch and Loic Van Doren they have two world class goalkeepers, while Arthur Van Doren, Victor Wegnez, Felix Denayer, Florent Van Aubel, John-John Dohmen, Alexander Hendrickx, Arthur de Sloover and Tom Boon – the latter two both shortlisted for the FIH Hockey Stars Player of the Year Award for 2022 – are all extraordinary talents. With strength and depth in every department, you can be sure Belgium will be rightly considered amongst the favourites for the title.

One to watch: Arthur Van Doren. A key figure in the Red Lions team that claimed the Olympic, World, European and FIH Hockey Pro League titles in recent years, defender Arthur Van Doren is a two-time winner of the FIH Player of the Year award and, without question, one of the finest players of the modern era.

Although the squad had not been confirmed at the time of writing, there are numerous names that we hope to see in action at this FIH Men's World Cup. Two Germany players were shortlisted for the FIH Hockey Stars Awards for 2022, with attacker Niklas Wellen gaining a nomination for the Best Player prize and goalkeeper Alexander Stadler nominated for the Best Goalkeeper award. They are far from being the only superstars in the Germany squad, with brilliant attacker Christopher Rühr, captain Mats Grambusch and penalty corner weapon Gonzalo Peillat – the man who fired Argentina to Olympic gold at Rio 2016 – just a handful of the world class players at the disposal of head coach Andre Henning.

One to watch: Christopher Rühr. A sensational attacker blessed with speed, skill, guile and supreme confidence. Named FIH Rising Star of the Year both in 2013 and 2015. If Rühr is on his game, Germany have every chance of claiming their first World Cup title since Mönchengladbach 2006.

At the delayed Olympic Games Tokyo 2020, the 2018 Asian Games gold medallists proved themselves to be a fearsome attacking unit that was perhaps unfortunate to be eliminated in the competition pool phase. The team that competes in Odisha is considerably less experienced than the one that took to the Olympic turf in Tokyo, with 11 players having fewer than 50 caps and ten athletes being aged between 18 and 23. Thirty-year-old captain Seren Tanaka is one of six players to have surpassed the 100 caps marker, alongside goalkeeper Takashi Yohikawa, Shota Yamada, Masaki Ohashi, Hiromasa Ochiai and Koji Yamasaki, all of whom competed at Tokyo 2020.

Japan, who sealed their place at this FIH Men's World Cup with a fourth-place finish at the 2022 Men's Asia Cup, were recently in action at the FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup in South Africa, recording wins against Canada and Pakistan on their way to a sixth-place finish. The team is coached by Akira Takahashi, who represented Japan at the 2002 FIH Men's World Cup in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia and, fascinatingly, was Head Coach of the Samurais four years later in Mönchengladbach.

One to watch: Koji Yamasaki. Top scored for Japan at the 2022 Men's Hockey Asia Cup with six goals, netting against India and Korea as well as a claiming a four-goal haul against Indonesia.

Veteran defender Jang Jonghyun and Hwang Taeil contributed 11 goals to that title success, sealing Korea's place back at the top table of international hockey.



The team have been involved in two high profile competitions in recent months, with Malaysia gaining a measure of revenge by defeating the Koreans 3-2 in the final of the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup in November. The Korea-Malaysia rivalry continued a couple of weeks later at the inaugural FIH Hockey Nations Cup, with evergreen 39-year-old captain Lee Namyong on the scoresheet as Korea recorded a superb 4-0 victory in the bronze medal game. While a bronze medal was not good enough for Korea to secure a berth in the next edition of the FIH Hockey Pro League, their solid performances at that competition in South Africa provided plenty of evidence that Korea are a team that should not be underestimated.

One to watch: Jang Jonghyun. An athlete with incredible longevity, 38-year-old defender Jang Jonghyun – top scorer at the recent FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup South Africa 2022 with seven goals – represented Korea as far back as the Athens 2004 Olympic Games. A brilliant penalty corner drag-flicker, Jang has scored more than 100 goals for his country and netted six times to help Korea claim the Hero Asia Cup in May-June 2022.

About the team: On 28 January 2022, Chile secured qualification for the FIH Men's World Cup for the first time in their history. A 3-1 victory over Mexico in the cross-over phase of the 2022 Men's Pan American Cup, being played on home soil in Santiago, had set up a winner-takes-all semi-final meeting with the USA.



It proved to be a match of huge tension, with neither team being able to break the deadlock before Chile emerged victorious in the shoot-out.

Chilean goalkeeper Adrian Henriquez was beaten just once in the one-on-ones, with Juan Amoroso, Franco Becerra and Kay Gesswein netting the goals to seal a place in the event final and the all-important World Cup ticket that came with it. The team were well beaten in the competition final, with Argentina storming to a 5-1 victory, but it mattered little.

In October 2022, Chile claimed their fourth silver medal at the South American Games in Luque, Paraguay, being defeated again by Argentina but scoring an incredible 53 goals in just five matches. The team is captained by Fernando Renz and coached by Jorge Dabanch.

One to watch: Juan Amoroso. A fifteen-goal haul at the 2022 South American Games saw Juan Amoroso finish well clear at the top of the competition scoring charts. The penalty corner expert could be a potent weapon for Chile in Odisha.

The team featured in two competitions in the latter part of 2022, winning the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup on home soil with a 3-2 victory over Korea before losing 4-0 to the same opponent in the bronze medal match at the inaugural FIH Hockey Men's Nations Cup South Africa 2022.

Known for their distinctive brand of high-paced attacking hockey, Malaysia – coached by Arul Anthoni, who represented the country as a player at the 1998 FIH Men's World Cup in Utrecht, Netherlands – are certainly capable of hurting any team that they play against. Razie Rahim is a potent weapon from penalty corner situations, while Faiz Jali, Firhan Ashari and Azuan Hasan bring a wealth of international experience to the table.

One to watch: Razie Rahim. At the age of 35 and with over 300 international appearances under his belt, key Razie is a defensive stalwart whose quality and experience plays a vital role in making the team tick. He is also a world class penalty corner drag-flicker, as he proved at the 2022 Men's Hockey Asia Cup, where he finished top scorer with 13 goals.

The young guns rose to the challenge in style, winning 12 of their 16 matches in the 2021-22 edition of the FIH Hockey Pro League to win the title for the first time. Captain Thierry Brinkman and striker Koen Bijen top scored for the Netherlands with seven goals apiece, with six goals coming from both Dennis Warmerdam and penalty corner ace Jip Janssen. Thanks to their excellent form, three Dutchmen earned nominations for the FIH Hockey Stars Awards for 2021-22, with captain Brinkman shortlisted for the Best Men's Player prize while Miles Bukkens and Pirmin Blaak were selected for the Rising Star and Best Goalkeeper awards respectively.

Having suffered painful defeats in the last two FIH Men's World Cup finals, the Netherlands will be aiming to make it third time lucky this time around and win a fourth world crown, a feat only Pakistan have managed to achieve.

One to watch: Thierry Brinkman. A creator and scorer of goals, the Netherlands captain is an inspirational figure who is a key part of the ongoing revolution being led by head coach Jeroen Delmee.

Highly regarded defensive midfielder Nick Ross makes a return to the team after taking a break throughout 2022, while 19-year-old debutant defender Charlie Morrison will be relishing the opportunity to show his talents on the big stage after gaining selection.

The team is coached by former South Africa striker Greg Nicol, who represented his country at the Atlanta 1996 and Athens 2004 Olympic Games as well as the 2002 FIH Men's World Cup in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

One to watch: Simon Child. As a prodigious teenager, Simon Child lit up the Mönchengladbach 2006 World Cup with a series of superb attacking displays. Now 34 and having scored 144 goals in 288 appearances, this certified Black Sticks legend is still capable of producing moments of match-winning brilliance.

England – coached by Paul Revington, former head coach of South Africa and Malaysia men and assistant coach to Great Britain women – were outstanding at the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games, with striker Nick Bandurak finishing as the competition's top scorer with 11 goals as his team snatched the bronze medal. Only one team managed to defeat the Englishmen in that competition, with the mighty Australia – a side that have only ever won gold in the Commonwealths – overturning a two-goal deficit in the semi-final to triumph 3-2. Captain Zach Wallace, midfield ace Phil Roper and attacker Sam Ward were all key players in Birmingham and will be hoping to replicate that form in Odisha. If they do, the sky is the limit.

One to watch: Zach Wallace. Nominated for the 2019 FIH Rising Star of the Year Award, Zach Wallace has established himself as a world class player who can have an impact in almost any position. The 23-year-old captained England at the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games, where the team claimed the bronze medal.

The star of the show is Harmanpreet Singh, a fabulous defender and one of the best drag flickers in the game, while goalkeeper PR Sreejesh, midfield ace Manpreet Singh and striker Mandeep Singh all capable of game-changing moments.

Despite the undeniable pressure that comes with being the competition hosts, this India team has all the attributes needed to claim their first FIH Men's World Cup title since 1975.

One to watch: Harmanpreet Singh. India's drag-flicking defender is a proven match winner who, at Tokyo 2020, played a crucial role in helping his team back onto the Olympic podium after an absence of 41 years. Named FIH Player of the Year both 2021 and 2022, Also finished top scorer of the 2021-22 edition of the FIH Hockey Pro League.

In August 2022, the Red Sticks showed strong form at the recent EuroHockey Championship Qualifier competition on home soil in Orense, beating Czech Republic, Portugal, and Poland to seal their ticket to the 2023 EuroHockey Championship. The team scored 20 times without conceding in that competition, with Pau Cunill (Rising Star nominee – FIH Hockey Stars Awards 2021-22), Iglesias and former Argentina international and 2016 Olympic gold medallist Joaquin Menini each scoring three times.

They followed that success with a superb start to their 2022-23 FIH Hockey Pro League campaign by going unbeaten in their first four games, claiming notable victories over New Zealand and Pool C rivals India in matches that took place in the World Cup host city of Bhubaneswar.

One to watch: Marc Miralles. A classy midfielder who has fully embraced his role as team captain, 24-year-old Miralles is likely to be a cornerstone of the Red Sticks set-up for many years to come.

Wales fell behind in the very first minute of the match when Michael Robson fired home, but Joe Naughalty's equaliser early in the second quarter proved to be enough to send the match to a winner-takes-all shoot-out. Successful efforts from Rupert Shipperley and Jack Pritchard gave Wales a 2-1 lead ahead of the final round, with goalkeeper Toby Reynolds-Cotterill doing enough to deny Ireland's Lee Cole and create a moment of Welsh sporting history.

The team finished the competition on a glorious high by recording a 2-1 victory over higher-ranked France, fighting back from a goal down thanks to goals from Luke Hawker and Shipperley, the latter arriving just five minutes from the end.

Current Great Britain internationals Shipperley and Jacob Draper are both key players for Wales, as is penalty corner specialist Gareth Furlong, who is a regular source of goals. Despite being one of the lowest ranked teams in this competition, Wales have proven themselves more than capable of punching above their weight and are certainly not here to make up the numbers.

One to watch: Rupert Shipperley. A member of the Great Britain team that participated at the delayed Olympic Games 2020, Wales co-captain Shipperley is an energetic, combative attacking midfielder with a keen eye for goal.
